On Tuesday, November 15th, Ulster County's Sherriff Figueroa came to visit Wallkill Senior High School and speak with students taking the Criminal Justice and Forensic Science clas-

ses. He enthusiastically talked to students about everything from what his job is like as a sheriff to how policing has changed with recent events. He even told some stories from his own life, including how he grew up locally and graduated from Wallkill High School. On the topic of modern policing, Sheriff Figueroa talked about how technology has

changed the field. He touched on how police look at social media now and explained the thin lines and rules that officers must be aware of. He also told the classes about how body cameras have changed police work. Sheriff Figueroa discussed how a person may make the occasional error in judgement or get "tunnel vision", whereas

a camera does not. As Sheriff Figueroa went on to mention, we have seen police body cams contribute to recent news events, such as the George Floyd case. Continuing the discussion,



he shared some positives and negatives that he sees with these new body cameras. Everyone present was captivated as he told stories from his work in the police field. The Ulster County Sherriff gave examples of different crimes scenes and cases he has worked on. Furthermore, Sheriff Figueroa told students all about what

duties his job entails and how he runs the Sheriff's Office. Many students found it interesting to learn that Sheriff is an elected position, meaning that he has his own office to run. Sheriff Figueroa explained how he personally runs the Sheriff's Office, including details about his relationship with the District Attorney's Office and who he decides to put in positions of power. Sheriff Figueroa was proud to share that he puts in great effort to make his office inclusive by saying that he has made sure to appoint people of color and keep his staff diverse. He was also honored to tell classes that he is the first Puerto Rican sheriff ever elected for the position in New York State. This, along with the effort he puts into running his office, was a very inspiring part of his visit. Finally, he opened the discussion up to questions from students, happily answering thoughtful questions. school and all the students who visited with Sherriff Figueroa thank him for spending time here and giving such a wonderful presentation!
